- 3. Foresight/Planning How do you recognize opportunities, instill positive thinking with staff and create the change you want to see? Making decisions for future good; exploring the idea of "servant leadership."
- 4. Connecting with Community different levels of connection for different needs, fostering the library as a community center.

OUTCOMES:

- Strategize with peers for broadening the impact of your library
- Reconsider leadership and engagement strategies with staff, patrons and community for more impact

Listening Session: Library Development Study

The State Librarian has appointed a Library Development Study Task Force to make recommendations regarding MSL library development services to 21st century Montana libraries. This Task Force is asked to seek feedback from the library community about the priorities for the work of the State Library and allocation of resources to do this work most efficiently. A primary purpose of this study will be to inform MSL on how the federal Library Services Technology Act (LSTA) and state Coal Severance Tax monies are spent beginning with the federal fiscal year 16 LSTA award. Recommendations will likely also inform budget requests for the 2017 legislative session.
